- Volunteer Virtually. DoSomething.org offers <u>nine places to volunteer</u> <u>without leaving your home</u>. Volunteer work offers the opportunity to learn new skills and make new work force connections, plus, employers look for volunteer work on your resume.
- Call on alums. Contact the career center for the names and contact information for alumni in the field you're interested in pursuing. Call to do informational interviews and to start building your professional network.
- Add to your skills by learning a new language. The ability to speak a second or third language is invaluable in a global work force. According to U.S. Foreign Service Institute research, it takes 480 hours to reach basic fluency in a Western European language, and 720 hours for more difficult languages. Some websites offer language lessons for free.
